Pastor’s Keyboard: “Discipleship: “An Open Door”

In the Book of Revelation, Jesus speaks promising words: “Behold I stand at the door & knock. If anyone hears my voice & opens the door, I will come in to him & eat with Him and he with me.” The seven letters to the 7 churches in Asia Minor end with an open door invitation. Chapter 4 begins with these hope-filled words: “After this I looked and behold a door standing open in heaven.” God has an open door for you!

When Jesus wrote to the church in Philadelphia, He introduced Himself as “the Holy One, the True One, who has the key of David, who opens and no one will shut, who shuts and no one opens.” Jesus knows the works of His beloved saints in Philadelphia. He offers his seemingly powerless servants an evangelical opportunity. They can focus on their trials & tribulations, hardships & persecutions, or they can bear witness to the Lamb who was slain and has begun His reign.

Doors are important. They serve many purposes. There are by-fold doors on closets, pocket doors for bathrooms, Dutch doors for church nurseries, garage doors, insulated doors, revolving



doors, sliding glass doors, etc. Doors provide access, privacy, confinement, and security. God has an open door for you. His name is Jesus. The Good Shepherd says, “Truly, truly, I say to you, I, I Am The Door of the sheep. If anyone enters by me he will be saved, and will go in and out and find pasture”—John 10.

“You have brains in your head. You have feet in your shoes. You can steer yourself in any direction you choose. Oh, the places you’ll go! Except when you don’t. Because, sometimes, you won’t.”

The fields are white for harvest, but the laborers are few. The decision is yours! An open door is a symbol of boundless opportunities. Jesus is an open door for you! Columbia researcher, [Sheena Iyengar](#), has found that the average person makes about 70 conscious decisions every day. That’s 25,550 decisions a year.

Over the course of 70 years, that’s 1,788,500 decisions. “Life is the sum of all your choices” (Albert Camus).

John Ortberg in his book, [All the Places To Go](#), writes about “divine opportunity alertness.” Be on the alert! An open door, biblically speaking, is an opportunity to bless someone else. “An open door may be thrilling to me, but it doesn’t exist solely for my benefit.” What to do? How to decide? Which door to walk through? God gives us the certainty of a compass, but not the precision of a roadmap.

Choosing a door is rarely easy. What if I get it wrong? When I moved from Lake Lillian, MN, to Little Falls, MN, someone asked, “How did you know that God wanted you to say yes to the call?” To this day, I still don’t know if I got it right. [But I do know this](#): God can use me to bless others wherever I am, if I seek to serve Him and

Men's Bible Study: Fall of 2019

This fall, we will launch into a new study. The new study will be about 16 weeks in length & will look at one of our Lutheran Confessional documents, entitled the Augsburg Confession. In 1530, the Lutheran reformers presented a statement of faith to the Holy Roman Emperor in the town of Augsburg, Germany. This statement of faith became known as the Augsburg Confession. This document was penned by Luther's dear friend Philip Melancthon, and is considered to be the bedrock & summary of what it means to be Lutheran. The Augsburg Confession is a true confession of the Christian faith because Christ Himself is expressed in it. This study is an opportunity for growing deeper in one's Lutheran identity & walk of discipleship. to honor His name! And I know this: We are marked by the doors we go through & by the doors we don't.

Ortberg writes, “‘Open door’ isn't a phrase to describe just any opportunity. An open door is an opportunity provided by God, to act *with* God & *for* God.” Jesus is *the* Door & the Holy Spirit is the opener. God opened a door for Abraham and Sarah, and they passed through it. Jesus opened a door and said to four fishermen, “Follow me.” And immediately they left their nets and passed through the open door. Every day God is opening doors for us to pass through. Decision making is unavoidable. Play it safe and live with regrets, or take a leap of faith and risk it all for heaven's sake.

Are you a closed-door person or an open-door person? In the Bible, when God calls someone to do something, no one responds by saying, “I'm ready!” Moses said, “I don't communicate well.” Jeremiah said, “I'm only a youth.” Isaiah said, “I'm a man of unclean lips.” Esther said, “If I approach the king without being summoned, I'll be put to death.” Sarah laughed and said, “I'm almost 90 and motherhood has passed me by.” Open-door people have their doubts, but they aren't hindered by uncertainty. They don't let ambiguity and risk paralyze them. Open-door people are blessed to bless, resist and persist, have fewer regrets, embrace excellent mistakes, accept their own imperfections, & trust in a Promising God. God still calls. God still sends. And if you say, “YES”...Oh the places you'll go!

Once a driveway provides access to the property, we'll have a “congregational field trip” so that member of Emmanuel will have a chance to visit and prayerfully consider the site.

Other matters discussed at our huddle included: The Byron Parade (Sunday, July 21 at 3pm); Mega Kids Camp (July 29-August 1); Emmanuel Picnic at Vomhof's (Sunday, August 4 at Noon); National Night Out—hosting sites (Tuesday, August 6); the Oasis Lease Agreement; and Thrivent Choice Dollars & Action Team grants.
