Pastor’s Keyboard: “Discipleship: “Thy WORD!”

“God’s Word is our great heritage, and shall be ours forever; to spread its light from age to age shall be our chief endeavor. Through life it guides our way; in death it is our stay. Lord, grant, while time shall last, your church may hold it fast; throughout all generations.”

Psalm 119 is the longest of the biblical psalms. It follows six Hallel psalms. Psalm 119 is a meditation on the gift of God’s Word. Martin Luther prized this psalm so highly that he would not take the whole world in exchange for one leaf of it. SCRIPTURE is mentioned in at least 171 of the 176 verses of this psalm.

In Psalm 119, eight words repeatedly describe God’s Word. As you meditate on this psalm watch for the following words: **law, testimonies precepts, statues, commandments, rules, word and promises.** All eight words are found in stanzas 41-48, 57-64, 73-80, 81-88, & 129-136.

Psalm 119 is an acrostic, structured by the 22 letters of the Hebrew alphabet, where each line of each 8 line stanza begins with the same letter. By using an acrostic, the Psalmist shows



how God’s holy Word commands every part of language & life (from A-Z). The Psalmist testifies to the power of God’s Word at work in his life. God’s Word comforts the afflicted and afflicts the comfortable, bringing about confession. Throughout the day, from sunrise to sunset, throughout the watches of the night, the Psalmist is engaged in ceaseless meditation. “God’s Word is a lamp to his feet and a light to his path”—vs. 105.

From birth to death, the Psalmist regularly praises God (vs. 164). The number seven suggests completion. This verse, Luther notes, is foundational for the practice of seven worship services in a day: Matins, Prime, Terce, Sext, Nones, Vespers, & Compline.

The Psalmist stores up and hides God’s Word in his heart, because it is a priceless, heavenly treasure. God’s Word is the Pearl of Great Price. It is sweeter than honey and better than thousands of gold & silver pieces. Fortunate is the one whose fortune is the LORD. The steadfast love of the LORD is our eternal hope! Verse 94 was a key verse for Luther: “I Am Yours; Save Me!”—a motto from John Staupitz.

In August, I attended a conference on the Psalter. The presenter was a gifted scholar from Australia. He encouraged us to visualize the psalms and not just think about them. He offered a comment that initially caught me off guard. He said, “We bring our experiences to the psalms.” During lunch, I sat with the presenter and his wife. I asked him about his comment. My concern was that people are always bringing their experiences to the Bible and then using

their experiences to interpret the Scriptures. I said to the presenter, “Correct me if I’m wrong, but I hear you saying that we bring our experiences to the Bible so that the Bible can interpret our experiences, not so that our experiences can interpret the Bible.” “That is correct,” he replied. Martin Luther offers a similar comment: “The best teacher is the one who does not bring his meaning to the Scripture, but gets his meaning from the Scripture.” This is the difference between Exegesis and Eisegesis; two conflicting approaches in Bible study.

Exegesis is the exposition or explanation of a Biblical text based on a careful, objective analysis. The word exegesis literally means “to lead out of.” That means that the interpreter is led to his conclusions by following the text. Scripture gives the interpreter the interpretation, not vice versa. Eisegesis is the interpretation of a passage based on a subjective, non-analytical reading. The word eisegesis literally means “to lead into,” which means the interpreter injects their own ideas into the text, making it mean whatever they want. Exegesis allows us to agree with the Bible; eisegesis seeks to force the Bible to agree with us. How one approaches the Scriptures is essential. Do we reverently bow before Christ and His Word, or do we lord over the Word and bend it to suit our own biases and sinful desires?

Psalm 119 is the longest hymn in the Bible. This psalm answers an important question: “How can a follower of Jesus keep walking in the WAY of the LORD?” Answer: “By guarding one’s WAY in accordance with God’s holy and precious Word.” Lord, we are yours! Save us! Thanks be to God!
