Pastor's Keyboard: "Discipleship - Music Celebration"

St. Paul writes, "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God." - Col. 3:16

On Saturday, August 13, Emmanuel worshipers will celebrate the gift of music by singing to the LORD a new song! The Psalms will serve as the structure & content of our evening liturgy. Discipleship is a musical offering!

The Psalter was Israel's Prayer Book and Hymnal. Steve Lawson, in his 2012 book, Preaching the Psalms, writes, "It was these two strategic books, Psalms & Romans, that Luther predominantly studied & taught in the years preceding his posting of the 95 Theses.

Romans principally formulated his doctrine, & the Psalms dramatically emboldened Luther to proclaim God's message to the world. In other words, Romans gave Luther his theology, but it was the Psalms that gave him his thunder."

Martin Luther, in his Foreword to Georg



Rhau's (1488 - 1548) Collection, "*Symphoniae iucundae*", wrote: "I, Doctor Martin Luther, wish all lovers of the unshackled art of music, grace & peace from God the Father and from our Lord Jesus Christ! I truly desire that all Christians would love and regard as worthy the lovely gift of music, which is a precious, worthy, and costly treasure given to mankind by God.

The riches of music are so excellent and so precious that words fail me whenever I attempt to discuss and describe them.... In summa, next to the Word of God, the noble art of music is the greatest treasure in the world. It controls our thoughts, minds, hearts, and spirits...

Our dear fathers and prophets did not desire without reason that music be always used in the churches. Hence, we have so many songs and psalms. This precious gift has been given to man alone that he might thereby remind himself that God has created man for the express purpose of praising & extolling God. However, when man's natural musical ability is whetted and polished to the extent that it becomes an art, then do we note with great surprise the great and perfect wisdom of God in music, which is, after all, His product and His gift.... a heavenly dance, where all meet in a spirit of friendliness, caress and embrace.

A person who gives this some thought & yet does not regard music as a marvelous creation of God, must be a clodhopper indeed and does not deserve to be called a human being; he should

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be permitted to hear nothing but the braying of asses and the grunting of hogs."

Some of you know that I love music & frequently sing in my sermons. The great music & liturgy of the Church is Scripture scored to the praise of God. When I was young, a pastor told me this: "If God gave you a voice, use it to praise Him; if not, use it to get even with Him."

"In the beginning, when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the earth." Listen carefully and you can hear this wind, caused by God's own breath, sweeping across the emptiness of precreation. What beautiful music! C.S. Lewis, in his book, *The Magician's Nephew*, recreates this scene. Aslan, the great lion who represents Jesus, sings Narnia into existence. It's a marvelous image of Aslan wandering around radiating this music that permeates everything. He breathes life into the earth and all sorts of creatures literally grow out of the ground.

One of my favorite hymns, penned by Robert Lowry in the 19th Century, includes these words: "*My life flows on in endless song; above earth's lamentation, I catch the sweet, though far-off hymn that hails a new creation. No storm can shake my inmost calm while to that Rock I'm clinging. Since Christ is Lord of heaven and earth, how can I keep from singing?*"

In Word and Sacrament, in Creation and on the Cross, Salvation is immersed in a Resurrection Song. The Tomb is empty! Christ is Risen Indeed! Amen. Amen. Amen.

SINCE YOU ASKED!

Why do we say in the Creeds that Jesus Christ "is seated at the right hand of the Father"? Does this mean that our Lord is far away from us? This has little to do with Christ's physical location. Instead it has to do with the authority He assumes. For a King to be seated on a throne is a symbolic gesture of his rule and authority. Heaven itself is a reality that transcends time & space. It is the unseen & timeless realm that underlies the visible & temporal world. We confess Christ to be seated at the right hand of the Father because we believe him to be the rightful King of the universe. Indeed, Jesus is Lord!

What does the Pastor's Stole signify? (the stole is the colored strip of cloth that loops around the back of the neck and hangs from both shoulders). The stole represents a yoke such as would be used to link & employ an ox with a plow or cart. When a work animal is yoked to a task, that animal comes under the rule & guidance of its master. As Christians we are to be yoked to Christ (Mt. 11:28-30). We are to fear, love, serve, and obey the Lord Jesus Christ. The Pastor's stole is therefore not only a sign of ordination in the Lutheran Church, but it visibly reminds the whole congregation of our servant hood to Christ.

POBLO is a Christian organization working to transform the way missions is approached in the United States by responding to the changing demographics that have brought the mission field to our own front yard. POBLO serves immigrants & refugees. POBLO trains & educates churches on how to engage in cross-cultural outreach, sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ in practical & culturally relevant ways. As Christians, we are called to “go and make disciples of all nations”. The U. S. has long been recognized as a melting pot of people, culture, & religion. The influx of Muslims and other non-Christian immigrants & refugees into the U.S. has grown significantly in recent decades, creating a truly global community. It is estimated that 45.8 million immigrants live in the United States—more than 13% of the total population; 7 million of whom are Muslim. For Christians called to bring the Gospel of Jesus to the nations, what better place to accomplish the mission than here? We no longer need to travel great distances to share God’s love with unreached people groups; we simply need to walk across the street. The mission field is here; the time is now!

Testimonial: “*The Man Whose Name was Changed*” - Through the efforts of POBLO International, Brookfield Lutheran Church (BLC) in Wisconsin is experiencing a breakthrough in outreach to the Indian Hindu community. The number of those from a Hindu background who connect to BLC every week exceeds 40—those coming to men’s Bible class, women’s Bible class, worship, English class, or serving as volunteers. Pastor Mrosko, thinking about Kishur's sincere love for Jesus, and seeing him as a future evangelist who will tell others replied, "Your new name is Andrew—I can see you telling your friends and others to come to Jesus, in the same way that Andrew told his brother about Jesus." (John 1:41-42) "Andrew immediately went to find his brother, Simon, saying, 'We have found the Messiah', and he brought Simon to Jesus."

Kishur's wife, was equally surprised by her husband's decision to take a new name. His wife commented, "I thought maybe he was kidding—but now I see he is serious, and that he's telling everyone to call him Andrew." Missionary Priya, who was present with her husband, Praveen, during the prayer said, "I thought I saw tears in his eyes." And Andrew himself later confessed, "If Pastor Mrosko had said one more word during the prayer, I would have started crying."

Now, Pastor Mrosko will work with Priya and Praveen to disciple Andrew, helping him to further understand who this Jesus is whom he desires to follow. Sometimes, as we experience new life through God's grace in Christ, it is also good to hang onto a sign of that newness, in this case, the name of one of the Twelve Disciples. May God bless Andrew on his new journey, as he prepares himself to be one who brings others to Jesus!
