Pastor’s Keyboard: “Discipleship: Atonement & the Cross”

Repent and believe in the Gospel! It’s the Season of Lent. Disciples journey with Jesus, walking wet, and practicing their baptism in daily living. Justified by faith alone, in Christ alone, we are *made right* with God through the *atonement sacrifice* of our Lord. Question: “Why did Jesus HAVE TO DIE?” Answer: “To make ATONEMENT for our sins.” Amazing Grace!

St. John writes, “In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent *his only Son* into the world, so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we have loved God but that God loved us and sent his Son to be the propitiation (*the atoning sacrifice*) for our sins.”—I John 4:9-10.

During the Season of Lent, I am participating in a Six Session Virtual Class from SOLA Publishing. The Zoom class is being led by Pastor Steven King. The class is all about “why Jesus had to die” What is the meaning of the cross? The word ATONEMENT means “AT-ONE-MENT.” In other words, what is separated and divided by sin is united and restored by forgiveness. The cross is necessary. The



death and resurrection of Jesus is necessary for our salvation. In fact, the death of Jesus on the cross is the ONLY WAY we must be saved! God sees to it!

“Christ took our sins and the sins of the whole world as well as the Father’s wrath on His shoulders, and He has drowned them both in Himself so that we are thereby reconciled to God and become completely righteous.”

— Martin Luther

It would be necessary for Jesus to die even if it were for your sin alone or my sin alone. That’s why we are fully responsible for this tragic death. As John Stott wisely observed, “Until you see the cross as that which is done *by you*, you will never appreciate that it is done *for you*.”

Pastor Steven King, in his SOLA Bible Study on the

ATONEMENT, reminds us that a sacrifice is required for our sin. All sin is against God, and therefore satisfaction & payment must be made to God to obtain restoration of a damaged relationship. There are unintentional sins, like parking in a “no parking” spot. One gets a ticket because one is guilty of breaking the law. Satisfaction is made when one pays the fine.

To use another example: If I borrow my neighbor’s tool, then I am expected to return it. If I damage/lose the tool, then satisfaction requires that I replace the tool. In other words, I need to make amends and set things right again. The relationship requires it.

How did ancient Israel understand atonement? Israel lived in a bartering society. Animals and grain were currency. The LORD commanded His people to worship Him and to offer sacrifices. God was not

simply interested in burnt offerings or blood. Sacrifices were not offered to appease an angry, hostile God. Sacrifices were offered in worship because God values the relationship He has with His people. How does one make amends when one has violated God's Law and damaged the relationship one has with God? Offenders (sinners) owe a debt to God, but how does one get payment up to God? Israel's currency, animals and grain, were converted to smoke. Pastor Steve King reminds us that in the Bible, the literal translation of "they offered a sacrifice to God," is actually "they converted it to smoke." In the sacrificial system of worship, God was teaching His people that relationships are valuable.

Atonement is necessary. What happens when one's debt is beyond one's ability to pay? Psalm 49 reminds us that "truly no man can ransom another, or give to God the price of his life, for the ransom of their life is costly and can never suffice." Sin is not only our acts of violation against God's LAW, it is also our broken and severed condition. We are in bondage to sin and we cannot free ourselves. The wages of sin is death. When the crime is a capital one, & one is unable to make necessary amends, then what? In such dire straights one must turn to a friend who can pay what they cannot pay. **"What a friend we have in Jesus, ALL our sins and griefs to bear."** The wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life. Only death can take care of the debt we owe; only death (the shedding of blood) can satisfy the capital punishment of our sin. God sees to it with the atoning sacrifice of His Son. Death is required to bring a will (Testament) into effect. "Would you be free from the burden of sin? There is power in the Blood!" Jesus MUST die!

God makes the necessary sacrifice on our behalf. Why? Because God loves & values us, and is determined to make ATONEMENT for our sins; to reconcile us with Himself & to restore our relationship. Satisfaction is necessary and required; and God satisfies! God sees to it on the cross. God pays our debt for us. God doesn't owe us, but God values us! "At the Lamb's high feast we sing; praise to our victorious King, who has washed us in the tide flowing from his pierced side; praise we him whose love divine, gives his sacred blood for wine, gives his body for the feast, *Christ the victim, Christ the priest.*" Jesus, as High Priest, offers the ONCE and FOR ALL atoning sacrifice for our sins (Hebrews 9). Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world!

Sacrifice teaches us value. A sacrifice is "something we give up in the present for the sake of a better future." The cross is necessary because God values us and is determined to make AT-ONE-MENT. Jesus had to die because my sin is a capital crime.

Salvation Army Food Pantry

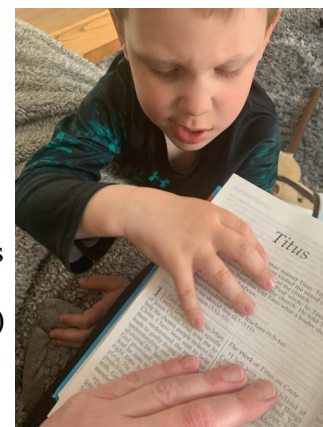
During the 7 Saturdays in Lent, friends and members of Emmanuel are donating
